

Huron SCIA News

HSCIA has rented ~40 acres from the County of Huron known as the Huronview site. We have levelled this field and planted a cover crop of cereal rye, rape and tillage radish to help hold soil in place over the winter and in to the spring. We plan to no-till soybeans on this field next year and rotate back to wheat. This then gives us the opportunity to address some drainage issues on the farm. We hope that this farm will be able to showcase some of the changes that can be made on farms around Ontario and show them being out in to place on a very challenging farm. We also started a program called Cover Huron which is a program to help farmers experiment with new cover crops or try cover crops for the first time. This program was run as a pilot project as this year has been a bit of a challenge with the weather and some of the rules need to be changed to make this easier, and also more attractive for the growers/participants. We hope to continue this program next year, and also ramp it up a bit.

Our AGM will be in the new year but uncertain of an exact date. We do know that we want to focus on cover crops and try and really get a more local, "Ontario" perspective than the info coming from the US on the internet. ~ courtesy Stefan Zehetner.

Regional Communication Coordinator (RCC) – Heartland SCIA

The Heartland Region of the Ontario Soil & Crop Improvement Association (OSCIA) consists of 4 local associations including Huron, Perth, Waterloo and Wellington Counties. The Regional Communications Coordinator (RCC) is a part time position working from a home office for a not for profit organization. OSCIA has eleven RCC positions across the Ontario for each of the Director regions focused on coordinating communications within each of these regions.

Duties include:

- o Responsible for creating, publishing, formatting, printing and distribution of a quarterly newsletter consisting of leading agriculture technology and significant events throughout the region.
- o Establish electronic linkage using current technology and software with the OSCIA provincial office for information exchange
- o Cooperate and assist with key regionally-significant events, encouraging inter county networking
- o Access grant funding and encourage sponsorship and financial contributions from local industry partners
- Assist in recruitment of members through local associations, and maintain online membership database
- o Provide reports, both to the <u>provincial office and HSCIA executive</u>, at least annually on the activities for the grants, sponsorship and event income etc. that are being administered locally and regionally.
- o Itemized and timely invoicing for expenses and salary
- Regional travel required, attending field days, crop tours, annual meetings and training sessions, to take pictures, develop content for the newsletter, and report activities occurring across the region, potentially 20-30 meetings per year, days and evenings included averaging approximately 10 hours/week
- o Maintain communication presence via HSCIA website/blog, Twitter and other social media promoting news and activities across the region
- o Includes secretary and treasurer duties for the association, monthly balancing and yearly reporting to be submitted for review
